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




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Lido Fleet 59

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Day Sailer Fleet 128

Due to the large vacancy that Fleet 128 left on the pages of the

Masthead in June, this article will take large, sweeping proportions.

Our first diversion takes us to Virginia for the Nationals, next we come back home to Lake Huntington for the Pacific Coast Champs/ High Sierra Regatta. Additionally, there are some Morro Bay Yacht Club races, summer one and two, that have also transpired.

Nationals

(Since driving to nationals took us longer than the actual event, it seems only fair to discuss the drive out.) Fleet 128 had two boats head out to Virginia for Nationals, *Luscious Pig* and *Student Driver*. Traveling through the Tehachapi pass on our way to the even-numbered freeways stripping the country from sea to sea, we elected to stop for gas. First stop that I can remember was Gail's friend's restaurant in Tehachapi called the Apple Shed. Great pie alamode and chicken potpies—we would have had more but we had already eaten at a previous stop, so this was a desert stop, mistake not this was a very important stop!

Little story here. If there was anything that defined this trip to Virginia, it would be all of the food stops. When you are driving 2800 miles, you need to look forward to any reason to stop and walk, and food and gas were the saviors. However, sadly enough, exercise was married to food on these diversions.

Second stop on our trip was Las Vegas, no big deal, pulled the boats down the "strip," saw the sights and the people, then back out onto the freeway. We stopped for dinner, remember it has been at least two hours since the last "feed," we tried a place called the Iron Skillet, which I promptly renamed the Iron Stomach; you may have stopped at one of these in the past and can commiserate with us. Our first night on the road was spent about 100 miles north of Vegas.

Up and on the road the next day, through Utah and most of Colorado. Highway 70 is absolutely gorgeous through this stretch of the continental divide. You drive right through Vail and the canyons leading to and from, finally dropping into Denver.

Kansas, Kansas was a ball. You could just watch the opening scenes of "The Wizard of Oz" or about ten minutes of "Twister" and understand how Kansas treated us

(and those people had the nerve to ask us about living in fear of farthquakes, wow).

Finally, we arrived in Virginia a day before the Nationals started, that is three days before the racing and one day before the two days allowed to measure the boat in. For those of you thinking of hitting nationals at Huntington next year, this is the standard pattern, two days of measuring, which you should be there for both, one to discover what is wrong with your boat and one to fix and re-measure your boat. Virginia welcomed us with a lightning storm the first night of our arrival, and when that ended, we stepped out of the motor home into what I thought was a warm waterfall, but later realized it was just a sunny, humid day.

For two days, we ran around from boat to boat fixing everything and anything that came up. By the end, the drill battery was dead and I was a quart of epoxy lighter. *Student Driver* needed some repairs, the centerboard was missing a chunk of the leading edge, the bow had a hole in it where the pad eye used to be, the rudder had bounced off the ground at a regatta in Redwood City, and the woodwork needed varnishing. *Luscious Pig* needed some re-rigging and touching up. Michael had allowed the spinnaker reel to retract without the halyard so we had to retrieve it and rewind it. These are all standard things when you are traveling all the time as the CCC Otters have been doing now for around three years.

Little story here, when we weighed *Student Driver* we discovered that she was 15 pounds under weight, the guy behind us was dumbfounded that a Day Sailer would be that far under weight. "Wow, why is your boat so light, what have you guys done to your boat, that is crazy" Gail informed him that we were already carrying 40 pounds in the boat to meet weight. Then his boat went up, and the scale read 507 #'s. Now for those of you not in the know, a Day Sailer is supposed to weigh 575; long story short, he spoke too soon.

On to the races. Three races on day one, *Student Driver* took a run away first, winning a bottle of wine from each boat in the fleet, to be shared later with each boat in the fleet, mainly we won control of the wine. Race two saw *Luscious Pig* at the top mark first followed closely by Keran and the rest of the "favored" sailors. End of the day it was Keran in the lead, *Student Driver* in fourth, and *Luscious Pig* in seventh, with Dean in tenth or so.

Day two, again three more races. *Student Driver* sneaked in a third and two more throw outs, *Luscious Pig* again leading up and struggling down. End of the day, *Student Driver* holding onto fourth on paper only (prior throw outs), with *Luscious Pig* experiencing some tough times but still in the upper half of the fleet. By the end of the Regatta, California had taken all but one of the first place honors, Dave three, Dean two, Condon 1, and one went to Bob Blake Junior. Yes the sailors from the west are hard to beat; however, the east coasters all not slackers, either.

At the end of the Regatta, the California Kid (Dave Keran) had stolen the entire event and the media coverage, easily. Long story short, long drive home, boy howdy!

Pacific Coast Champs and High Sierra Regatta

This is probably the most attended away regatta for Fleet 128 CCC Otters. Morro Bay always has the largest turnout of all of the other yacht clubs.

This year these two events were combined, with three races on Friday making up the first half of the PCCs and the next three races making up the High Sierra and added to the PCCs. Day one saw 27 boats hitting the line, with everyone looking to be number one. Race one went off well, but race two saw a general recall, standard fair if anyone remembers last year's regatta where the fleet had three general recalls in one race alone!

Race one saw the entire fleet dancing up a full jig all the way up to the windward mark. No easy or short races for day one. At the end of the day, the Day Sailers had traveled 18.7 miles on the race course alone, disregarding all of the additional miles that the boats traveled to and from the staging area, big day. Kenton and John showed that they meant business with the big boys and finished the day in the top ten, with *Student Driver* one point behind them. *Luscious Pig* close to the *Driver*, *Dos Osos*, and *Running with Scissors* close behind. In the B fleet, Morro Bay dominated both in numbers and the top places. A new arrival, Dan, on 4000 dominated both the PCCs and the HSR, with Tom Murphey close behind.

Little story here, three races, traversing almost 19 miles is extremely exhausting in these dinghies. At the end of the day, my crew on *Student Driver* was beginning to "discuss" how exhausted she was from the day's events. Funny thing, so was everyone. Everywhere that we walked, every boat was full of bruised and tired people.

Day two was easy enough, a good workout the day before had loosened all of us up and made us feel ready to give the next day at least say 75 or 70%. The second day saw the fleet giving a stronger effort and a better performance, at least that is the way that I remember it. Huntington always delvers, that is if you stick to the left for the first half of the lake and then pick your shifts to the top mark, it will deliver you to the top mark in with everyone else.

Downhill I noticed that many of the fleet members have really improved their spinnaker flying skills, both across the wind and straight downwind. Kudos!

The Fresno Yacht club put on a great dinner/get together—that is when I realized how um "productive" those Fiocks are, now that is a huge family! Dean and Dottie hosted the party and did a fantastic job, great food, and great company.

One thing that was greatly helpful is the ease that information and tuning tips spread from the lips of all of the Day Sailers. Each evening the top of the fleet would offer great, solicited and otherwise, comments about what could be done better, how to setup the boat, how to read the stinking whirly gig with all of the numbers, and more importantly which numbers matter. Tack, tack, tack, tack, it never ends, jibe, jibe, jibe, jibe, mark roundings, pirouettes (720s), Huntington and the competitiveness of this fleet delivers a wallop to the cranium and the body.

At the end it was Dave first, Kenton and John first of the MBYC boats to finish at 7th, *Student Driver* next at 13th, *Luscious Pig* a couple of places behind with Lex eking ahead of Peter and several other boats in the A fleet.

Finally, we had several races that I missed personally, but I gather that John and Kenton are currently leading the Summer Series and that many boats from Fleet 128 participated in this event.

On to the upcoming month. Not many races will happen between now and the Invitational. To keep up our strengths in racing and sailing, I strongly promote everyone to participate in the Wednesday "captain fun" all-day sail a thon. We intend to attend a couple in the upcoming weeks and everyone should, lets give those out-of-towners a good run here on the home front! If anyone desires any advice pointers, setup tips or otherwise, please do not hesitate to email me (Sailorkevo@aol.com) or to ask anyone you feel you would like to emulate. I hope to see everyone having fun with their boats this summer, see you on the water.

On the menu -- Delicious bratwurst, sauerkraut, German potato salad, rolls, coffee, and dessert. Dinner and Show, only \$7.00.




