Should you be curious as to what the MBYC bylaws say about delinquencies, please refer to Article X of our By-Laws:

ARTICLE X: DELINQUENT MEMBERS

Section 1 The treasurer shall promptly notify the Board of Directors if a member's dues, assessments or other monies remain unpaid sixty (60) days after the same become due and payable. The Treasurer shall, by certified mail, send written notice to said member indicating that membership privileges may be suspended until such indebtedness is re-solved.

Section 2 Any member whose indebtedness to the club remains unpaid thirty (30) days after the date of notification of delinquency may be dropped from membership. The Secretary, using certified mail, shall send notification of such action to the delinquent member. Every such member shall have the right to appear before the board before final action shall be taken. The board of Directors, however, shall have the authority to suspend this section in individual cases for good and sufficient reasons.

As a reminder, Valentine's Day will occur on the third Happy Hour of the month. Be advised that there are rumors swirling that the Kurmudgeons will be running around the club that night dressed like Cupid and armed with bows and arrows. We are not sure what this means, but rest assured, we are looking into it.



California Boater Card

Who/What/When/Where/Why — Are you ready?

Q: What is a California Boater Card?

A: The California Boater Card will show that its holder has successfully taken and passed a NASBLA/state - approved boater safety education examination. As of Jan. 1, 2018, California phased in by age the requirement that residents who operate a motorized recreational vessel on state waterways will be required to carry the California Boater Card. The card will be issued by the California State Parks Division of Boating and Waterways (DBW).

Q: Where did the idea of a California Boater Card come from?

A: Legislative bills requiring some form of boating education in the state have been authored over the years. On Sept. 18, 2014, Governor Edmund G. Brown, Jr. signed into law Senate Bill 941, which prohibits the operation of motorized vessels in California without a valid Boater Card developed and issued by DBW.

Q: What are the benefits of taking a boater safety course?

A: Not only is mandatory education the law, the California Boater Card Program promotes boating safety on our waterways. U. S. Coast Guard accident data show that states with some form of boating safety education have fewer accidents and fatalities than states without any boater education requirements. In 2015, 724 California recreational vessels were involved in reported accidents and 49 boaters died. More than 232 boaters were injured in severity beyond first aid treatment. Only one of the boat operators involved in fatal accidents had taken an approved boating safety course. Increased numbers of boaters taking approved safety courses will benefit all California recreational boaters.

Q: When can I apply for my California Boater Card and what will it cost?

A: DBW plans to begin issuing the California Boater Cards prior to Jan. 1, 2018, implementation date. The Boater Card Technical Advisory Group anticipates that the cost of the card will be no more than \$10. The lost

card replacement fee will be no more than \$5. Q: When will operators be required to have a Boater Card?

A: The new requirement will begin on Jan. 1, 2018 for all persons 20 years of age and younger who operate a recreational motorized vessel on state waterways. On that date these boaters will be required to carry a boater card issued by DBW, unless they meet certain exemptions.

Each year after January 2018, a new age group will be added to those who are required to possess a valid card. By 2025, all persons who operate a motorized recreational vessel on California waters will be required to have one. Once issued, the card remains valid for a boat operator's lifetime. California Harbors and Navigation Code Section 678.11(b) contains the following phase-in schedule based on operator age:

- January 1, 2018 Persons 20 years of age or younger
- January 1, 2019 Persons 25 years of age or younger
- January 1, 2020 Persons 35 years of age or younger
- January 1, 2021 Persons 40 years of age or younger
- January 1, 2022 Persons 45 years of age or younger
- January 1, 2023 Persons 50 years of age or younger
- January 1, 2024 Persons 60 years of age or younger
- January 1, 2025 All persons regardless of age

*California age restrictions for operating a motorized vessel: According to California Harbors and Navigation Code Section 658.5, NO person under 16 years of age may operate a boat with a motor of more than 15 horsepower, except for a sailboat that does not exceed 30 feet in length or a dinghy used directly between a moored boat and the shore (or between two moored boats). The law allows children 12-15 years of age to operate boats with a motor of more than 15 horsepower or sailboats over 30 feet if supervised on board by an adult at least 18 years of age. Violating these provisions constitutes and infraction.

Q: What courses will be approved to offer Boater Card exams, and how will I find them?

A: Boating safety course providers must be NASBLA approved and be state-approved by DBW. Courses may be classroom, home study or online. The current list of approved courses can be found online at www.CaliforniaBoater-Card.com.

Q: How much time will it take to complete an approved boating safety course A: Approved online courses run a minimum of three hours to complete.

Director's Report Three projects in the works

So far, besides participating in the Morro Bay Youth Sailing Foundation, I have three "projects" for the club.

Last year I was asked to participate on a committee to develop criteria for approving members to use the club's launches. Vice Commodore Chris Surfleet has been chairing the effort, so I'll let him give the status of this effort when he is ready.

Last year Joe

Smoking is no longer allowed anywhere at club.

Huntsinger asked me to help get a glassware sterilizer installed in the bar in 2020. I can report that I found the least expensive source for the sterilizer approved last year, arranged the club to be invoiced, and have forward the invoice to the Treasurer for payment. The easy part is done.

It was decided at the January board meeting that the no-smoking policy updated last year should be put into the form of a policy letter. I'll be developing a draft for the board's consideration in February. The club is now a smoke free facility. Maybe I'll even find the opportunity to augment these administrative tasks with some time on the water. One can always hope. — *Greg Barker, Director*




in and on the bay. The weather was also very good. The second float on the 13th had two more besides myself show up. The morning was rather cold, which did discourage some from participating.



Happy Hour Hosting — Why Me plus Tips and Tricks

As a part of your membership hosting Happy Hour is a "voluntary obligation," yet not so voluntary and more.

You will be notified of your date to serve in the following ways: 1. On the Morro Bay Yacht Club web page (mbyc.net) your name will appear on the Friday calendar several months in advance of your scheduled date to serve.

2. Three months before your scheduled date you will receive and email notifying you of your date of service and the other persons you will serve with. Your name will also appear each month in the Masthead until your date of service.

It is your responsibility to keep a current email on file with the membership committee.

Changes to Assigned Dates-If you are unable to fulfill your Happy Hour duties on the assigned date, YOU are responsible for finding a member to act as your replacement. Please report all schedule changes to the Social Hour Coordinator who is listed in the Masthead. Member contact info is available in the roster at MBYC.net.

If distance or your health is an obstacle to your successfully hosting happy hour you have to request to "opt out" by sending the board a letter describing your handicap. The Social Hour Coordinator may not make this determination. (Per Policy Letter 20A: Members who wish to opt out of hosting Happy Hour will need to provide to the Board a letter explaining why they wish to do so. The Board will review the letters and all letters will be kept confidential)

Happy Hour is every Friday night from 5:30 to 7:30 PM. Generally Happy Hour is hosted by 4 persons, often 2 couples, but there are quite a few single memberships in the club. How

often you serve depends on membership numbers but currently the interval is about every 14 months. Cocktail service begins at 5:30, but food is not put out upstairs until 6:00 PM. It is expected that hosts will provide snacks, serve cocktails, and clean up after Happy Hour.

You are expected to lock up the bar, unless remaining members express that they will lock up after you leave. If there are no remaining members in the club, you will be expected to check all the doors to make sure they are locked, and close the club.

The food you serve is your choice — just think of the Happy Hours you have attended and what did you like. Some members choose

to do theme Happy Hour presentations that may amount to a light dinner. Others choose just to put out some veggie and cheese trays, some order pizza, and others just throw Costco appetizers in the oven. This should be thought of as an opportunity for the hosts to express their personal enjoyment of food/snacks in any way they desire.

The Happy Hour food is meant to accompany alcoholic beverages, so no one is drinking on an empty stomach. Happy Hours average 50-75 people, but during the holidays they may be less attended, and when special events occur, there may be quite a few guests. The suggestion is to make sure you have enough of what you are serving for 50 persons. To make it simple, the galley provides paper plates (both 6 7/8" and 8

1/2" sizes), plasticware. Paper plates, paper bowls, plastic utensils and napkins are all stored in the cabinet marked Happy Hour, or the cabinet right next to that cabinet.

You are welcome to use the galley to cook any foods you are serving. The BBQ is also available. If you use the stove top or flat top grill, be sure to turn the exhaust fan on (switches on the wall to the right of the stove). If you use the flat top, please clean it. While the flat top is still hot, pour some hot water on it – beware of steam, and scrape with side of large pancake turner to remove any debris or excess oil, then scrub with the palmetto brush, pushing debris into grease trap on left side of flat top.



You are also welcome to use any of the serving utensils that are in cabinets (many assorted trays and bowls) as well as many pots, pans and sheet pans. The club also has a collection of melamine dinner plates and bowls and some regular flatware (as opposed to plastic).

After Happy Hour, please clean kitchen, wash all re-usable serving items and leave to dry in the rack if there is room. We prefer dishes to air dry but if necessary, use a clean towel to dry them (clean towels in a drawer). Sweep kitchen, empty trash cans

downstairs and upstairs and replace bag (these are usually in the first cabinet by fridge), wipe down buffet tables and bar tables. Lock up the bar. Dirty towels go in laundry bag under right side of the sink. Go home and put your feet up, you deserve it! We do not currently have tablecloths for the buffet tables upstairs. In general, 2-6ft tables are used for savory foods, and 1-6 ft table for sweets and desserts.

Happy Hour Hosting - Changes to Assigned Dates: If you are unable to fulfill your Happy Hour duties on the assigned date, you are responsible for finding a member to act as your replacement. Please report all schedule changes to the Happy Hour Coordinator.

Good To Review Safe Boating Precautions

Safe boating involves a number of precautions. A life jacket should be present in the boat for every person on board. Ideally, everyone aboard should wear a life jacket at all times, but any occupants younger than age 13 are required to wear life jackets during the entire excursion.

For optimal safety, one person should be appointed as a lookout to assist the driver. This ensures that at least two people are watching and vigilant of surrounding situations at all times.

Boaters must look out for hazards including other vessels, swimmers, aquatic life, submerged objects, and areas of shallow water that could cause the vessel to run aground. Anyone who plans to drive a boat should enroll in and complete a boater education class to make sure that they know how to keep themselves, their passengers, and their vessel safe from harm.

Much the same as when driving a car or truck on land, the driver of a boat must never consume alcohol or drugs while operating the watercraft. When a boating accident involves alcohol, the likelihood of fatalities doubles.
