which session of classes.





Of course, after taking a summer sailing course at MBYC, the obvious first thing to do is to go find an O'Day Day Sailer that can be your very own. Somehow sailing in Morro Bay, that seemed so easy in class with other novice sailors and an extremely competent and experienced teacher, is instantly daunting as well as dreadfully frustrating. This bay, so beautiful to view, is full of hazards to an inexperience sailor. From the strong current, to the moored sailboats that seem to fill the entire bay, to



the ever-growing sand spit, the clueless kayakers, the impatient fishing boats, and of course the capricious wind, it's enough to truly test even the bravest novice sailor.

Once you own the boat, the next thing is to get a spot in the boat yard. This also is no easy feat as there is very little turnover in the MBYC boat yard. If there is no room in the yard, the Harbor Department does have some boat storage down in front of the stacks. If neither of these works out, then the boat will have to be parked somewhere else. Most important item to note is that the mast must come down before the boat is driven up the hill from the Embarcadero. Many a mast has taken down power and cable lines on Marina Street.

The Day Sailer is considered by many to be a very versatile boat, that is easy to rig, sail, transport, and store. Some consider it a family boat with the ability to seat 6. Seems like that little boat that weighs about 575 pounds would be awfully weighed down with 6 adults, so let's stick with 2 people in the boat, maybe 4 for a picnic on the spit. The boat is easy to rig – tighten the stays and shrouds, mount the sails, hoist the boat in the water, mount the rudder and raise the sails. Getting off the dock can at times be a challenge if the wind is coming off the spit, but usually there is a helping hand that can push the boat off the dock.

So many things to remember and then its time to race! What is the course, how many horn sounds until the start, was that the one-minute horn, are the flags up or down, is the spinnaker rigged? What are the right-of-way rules and how do they change with overlap, and in the vicinity of marks. Oh well, someone always



has to be in last place, as this club is full of very competitive sailors sometimes with extreme attitudes – have your squirt gun ready, or heavier armament. Maybe just be ready to protest we all have lawyers or is that liars!



So maybe racing isn't your bag, and you just want to cruise for fun. Watch out for the otter that is directly in your way. Oh yeah, then the fleet of kayakers, then the wind quits, the bay glasses off, and the boat is being swept away by an outgoing current – next stop Tahiti. Wait what happened to that fun cruise? Oh well there are always libations to be had back at the yacht club.



Spring always brings in blustery weather to Morro Bay, and one always pays attention to the forecasts before going out on the water. When I send out notifications for the floats I always check the weather and include appropriate advisories in the emails. In the spring, I often warn of cool and windy weather so participants will be prepared for the paddle.

The winds will often make the bay choppy and hard to paddle against when headed back to the dock. Frequently, when leaving the dock we head directly across to the lee side of the sandspit to reduce the effects of the wind on our paddling and to get into smoother water. On two occasions I have advised against going out on the Fun Float due to weather conditions, and both times I made the wrong call. The weather was easily good enough for an enjoyable Fun Float. Therefore, from now on I'm not going to make a "do not attend" advisory, but I will still report the expected weather.

Our recent Fun Floats have had a minimal of attendance, but I'm guessing that is due to the expected weather and the fact that we are still a bit reluctant about getting back together with a group of people. As the weather improves and we move into a time of fewer Covid safety restrictions, I am sure attendance will improve. We haven't planned any Fun Float parties yet, but I'm hoping we will be able to start doing that soon.

If you are not receiving email notifications of Fun Float events and you want notifications, then please send me your email address to add to the notification list. You can drop your name off the list any time by selecting the option at the bottom of the Fun Float email notifications sent to you.

We are still practicing Covid safety by maintaining social distancing and wearing masks while on the MBYC property, but the natural social distancing of paddling allows us to relax a bit more while on the water. We maintain social-distancing when we have lunch on the sand spit, but because we are outside

we usually abandon the masks to eat lunch and share conversation.

I hope you can plan to attend an upcoming FunFloat. We leave the dock at 11:00 am and usually return to the dock around 1:00 to 1:30 pm.
