Of course, at that time the lake was full and there was even a contest in the newspaper to guess the date and time that water would go down the spillway; wow how times have changed! It seems that I always wanted to learn to sail, but never found a

way. So thanks to my oldest friend in California, Keith Valley, I picked up a life-long passion!

After a few times out and getting a little more comfortable, I bought a Cyclone, designed by Frank Butler and made by Catalina as a competitor to Laser. I spent the whole of that summer learning how to self-rescue. This is a critical skill for small boat sailing at Lopez Lake. I got "the hang" of it and pretty soon was chasing windsurfers across Mallard

Yacht Club, which at the time was racing 2 or more times a month. Through that racing I came to know quite a few MBYC members and did quite a few races in Morro Bay with my little Cyclone. As time moved on, I got bigger and bigger boats, going through a Mercury 18 and a BB11 (wooden boats) and then a Sparkman and Stevens designed Columbia 29, and a whole collection of other boats over the years! As our family grew and I spent less time out on the water, we decided to sell the "big boat" (big to us anyway).

Having spent some time around MBYC, I got to know Michael Measures, who put me onto a DaySailer

that was in search of a new home. On the day we sold the Columbia, I took some of the money and brought home my first DSI. I think it might have been in 1996 or 1997, but I'm not really sure. I sailed with Fleet 128 at MBYC and at Lopez Lake with SLYC for many years. As my work life changed and I was out of town most of the time the DSI wasn't used, and I didn't get much time on the water either! So, I sold it, of course back to Michael for "re-homing" to someone else.

After work wound down for me a few years ago and I was around home so much I thought I'd get back into Fleet 128. I found a DSII up in Oregon and brought it home. By now I had (have) a few boats, and didn't get out with the new DS right away. Then, COVID lockdowns and restrictions put it on the back burner. After deciding to stay in this area, we finally approached MBYC to join and were accepted into the club last year, in spite of COVID! We're out racing most boat races and wet Wednesdays now. I have to admit that a successful race day has just been getting to the start line, and sometimes we finish too!!!

I think I like working on and restoring old boats almost as much as I do sailing and racing. So, I'm always "on the hunt" for old boats that are "in need". Right now I have 2 DSIs (one a complete "resto-mod" project and one a simple repair, clean-up, and sail project - more on this boat another time) and the DSII which is in the mast-up storage by the old power plant ready to go at any time.

So that's how I came to be a DaySailer! Who will be next to tell their "DaySailer Life Story???"

Big Rock Regatta, March 19 & 20, 2022

This month the MBYC hosted the Big Rock Regatta which was the fifth of a six races in the SCYYRA (Southern California Youth Yacht Racing Association) Carrie Optimist Series. The first Big Rock Regatta was held in 2008 and won by our own Roy McClish.

We are very proud of our MBYC Junior Yacht Club competitors who participated this year. In the Championship Fleet we had GG Stones, Adrian Brown, and Clint Bryan. In the Green Fleet we had Gunner Paris, Charlie Rice, Elizabeth Bonilla, Sampson Stones, and Jason Stones. Assisting on our Coach Boats we had our Junior Yacht Club members Owen Blackwell, Elias Blackwell, and Corrine Matson.

This year there were a total of 57 Optis, 34 in the Championship Fleet and 23 in the Green Fleet. Other Junior Programs attending



the regatta were from Del Rey Yacht Club, California Yacht Club,



In Saturday's very light conditions the Champion Fleet course was set in the harbor entrance basin and only one race was completed before abandoning the remainder of the days' races. The Green Fleet course was set in the basin just south of the launch ramp and was not able

to complete a race.

However, Sunday was another story. The race schedule was moved up an hour to 10:30 a.m. start anticipating the forecasted high winds. The Championship Fleet course was inside to the main channel north of the seal dock. The advanced skills were evident as hoats were capsizing

as boats were capsizing, some pitch poling, and the sailors getting right back into their boats and continuing to sail while bailing. Five races were completed.





Some great competition continued down on the Green Fleet course as the wind built after each race. Gunner Paris had a 10th in the first race. In the second race Gunner was the first to round the top mark, was passed by Gunnar Marshall of SBYSF while mak-

ing a 360 penalty turn for hitting the top mark and regained the lead on the final leg passing Gunner Marshall and take a first. Gunner Paris and others decided to give it up after the fourth race as it began to white cap.

On the final 7th race with some boats dropping out as the wind built, 16 Optis started the race and 4 where able to conquer the winds and finish the race, One of them being our own Sampson Stones.

After the racing finished and boats and gear stowed onto their club's multi boat trailers, the awards ceremony was held upstairs. All Green Fleet Sailors received participation awards and awards were given to the top three sailors from each the Red, White, and Blue Championship Fleet. Cooper Keeves of Del Rey Yacht Club took home the top honors and his name will be engraved on the Big Rock Perpetual Trophy which hangs on the wall of the dining room on the right side of the galley folding doors.

We received many thanks and praise from the out-of-towners for the beauty of our club, our bay, and hospitality from our members and overall fun that was had by all.

Thanks to the many volunteers who helped make this event such a big success!
