The Basics of Marine Radio Use

To use your VHF, turn it on and pick a channel, set the squelch to the point where you don't hear any white noise, and begin talking. Things to remember when you are on the radio:

Monitor channel 16 when you are not actively in conversation with someone else. While not required for recreational boaters, it is an unwritten rule for radio users.

Don't tie up channel 16 or channel 9. If you are talking with someone, switch to a working channel so you are not keep-

ing others from using channel 16 or 9. In some instances, the Coast Guard may even order you to switch channels if you are talking excessively on 16 or 9.

A VHF radio is not a telephone. When you use your VHF, everyone tuned to that station in the area can hear you! Watch your language, and try to keep your conversations short and to the point so that others may use the channel.

It is unlawful to intentionally transmit a false distress alert, or intentionally transmit a false alert without taking steps to cancel that alert.

BoatUS Crew Overboard (COB)

Preventing an overboard situation is relatively easy when you use a little common sense. Sadly, one of the most common causes of COB and subsequently drowning is a crew member relieving himself over the side of the boat in a standing position. Avoid this disaster; go below and use the head.

Three Points of Contact
While on board you should always
strive to have three points of contact
with the boat. This means, you should
have both feet planted and holding on
with at least one hand. Or, if you are
moving about, hold on with both hands
to something firm like a grab rail or
stanchion and take one step at a time.
If seated, have your feet touching the

floor, or holding on with both hands. Having three points of contact assures that your body is positioned in such a way that the majority of your body is in contact with the boat, and you won't be set off-balance easily.

Avoid standing and sudden movements whenever operating your boat and plan ahead to avoid unsafe operating & environmental conditions.



Cleaning Keeping your boat clean is important part of maintenance

But soaps and harsh cleaners running off into the water can have a negative impact on our waterways. While a few bubbles in the water seem harmless, soaps work by breaking down cell membranes, that is why most cleaners are toxic to marine life.

Here are few tips to minimize the impact of boat cleaning:
If your marina has a designated wash down area use that for all boat cleaning.

Regularly rinse the boat with fresh water to avoid needing harsh cleaners. Power washing or high pressure washing can remove bottom paint so it is especially important to save pressure washing for when your boat is in the washdown area.

When you must use soaps, read the labels carefully. Look for non toxic and biodegradable products and use them sparingly. Don't believe all environmental claims. Most products require treatment in wastewater treatment plant to be truly non toxic and biodegradable, so use them in an area that doesn't drain directly to the water.

FINAL THOUGHTS ON LONG-RANGE PLANNING

Over the last three years I've usually only submitted a Masthead article to give members an update on long-term planning or solicit ideas and opinions. With only one issue left before my term ends, I'd like to throw two thoughts out for members to think about in the coming year.

First, the club is in decent shape financially for its current needs, but we're not positioned to meet important long-term goals. As I said at the November



General Meeting, about 30 years ago some members with foresight established what at the time was called the 2011 Fund, with the intent to save money to buy the boatyard we lease across the street. Some have been dispirited that the value of the site has risen above what we have been able to set aside, but it is not all glum... we do have enough for a traditional downpayment.

However, our income may be another issue. We've started looking at financing options, but there remain some blanks to fill in, most importantly the annual revenue we will need to show to qualify for a loan to balance. Tom Ingram has had some conversations with local banks, and I have reached out to a loan officer with Chase who specializes working with non-profits. In the near future we need to determine the criteria we must meet to finance the boatyard if it becomes available, determine what we have to do to meet those criteria, and if necessary adjust our dues and fees so we will qualify for a loan when the boatyard becomes available. This will also help us with other important needs such as addressing the maintenance or replacement of our hoist. We will need to develop a consensus of the membership that we can get passed at a general meeting.


Second, I would like to say something about the elevator assessment. There have been complaints that at the rate the fund is growing that it will take 40 years or so to install an elevator, and there are members who don't see putting money in for a project they are unlikely to benefit from. The elevator assessment was intended as seed money to stimulate other fundraising and eventually roll into the annual expenses to maintain an elevator. The fundraising efforts got started but wained pretty quickly. To me, the argument should not be that the assessment and its related fund should be eliminated if it cannot deliver on an elevator in our lifetimes — it should be what to do with the assessment and fund if there is not enough support for the elevator to do the intended fundraising.

We'll have some decisions to make and act upon in the coming year or two. Think about what you would like to see the club accomplish in the future and how you are willing to support that to make it happen.

Not so much —

Now that all the salty spinnakers have been dried out, blocks and winch-handles stowed, lines coiled, beers drunk, chants chanted ("Fast is Fun, fast is Fun...), and all the Santa Cruz 27s washed down and loaded back on trailers and towed back to their far flung homes—how long has it been, a month, two?—some of us in the 27 fleet thought it might be in-structive to take a second look back highlight some of the moments that made the race a triumph, both on the water and off. system), as well as some new race committee flags. And it shouldn't be a surprise that the bar brought in an additional \$3000 over the weekend for the club (like we said, "Drinking is Fun!".

What Did We Learn?—

In the end, we learned what we already knew. MBYC is a special place. A place in the literal sense — our stately building, the docks, the decks that look out onto the rock, sure — but more than that, a place made up of truly cool people. In his closing comments, our Fleet Captain John Krossa said that the race was more about "friends and community" than about what happens on the water.

We in the 27 Fleet couldn't agree more. To each and everyone who helped (those mentioned here and others who were not), thanks again for making the event happen.
