

Proposed change to Fleet Championship to include up to four MBYC Bay Fleet races as part of the Championship with a final regatta to be held over Labor Day.

Also we will discuss the possibility of the final Championship Regatta extending for two days with the possibility of a bar-b-que as well. As usual we'll be looking for volunteers for various parts of the event.

Planning for the annual DS Fleet 128 Invitational Regatta to be held over the weekend of October 26 & 27. Many volunteers are needed for this event to pick up areas such as food, t-shirts, awards, on-the-water assistance.

DS FLEET 128 CHAMPIONSHIP MAY INCLUDE SUMMER SEASON RACE DATES

An idea is circulating to establish a DaySailer Fleet 128 "racing season". The season will start in May and run through Labor Day, ending with a Championship Regatta and end-of-season bar-b-que. The idea is to develop a Championship "Pursuit" over the summer.

Four of the MBYC Bay Races (Portsmouth Handicap) could be designated as DS Championship Pursuit Races and included in scoring for the 2024 Championship Pursuit. The races will continue to be the typical Bay Fleet Portsmouth Handicap Races. Separately we will score those Daysailers that compete. The individual race results will be included with the Championship Regatta on Labor Day for Championship Pursuit final scoring and the perpetual award.

Scoring for each race will be the low point system (RRS Appendix A) as will overall scoring for the Championship trophy. A number of throw outs will allow a boat to miss one of the regular MBYC regattas. To compete for the Championship Pursuit a skipper must race in at least one of the Championship Regatta Days (assuming we sail two days).

One note about the Deed of Gift. It currently stipulates that to be included a skipper MUST be a member of the DS Association and DS Fleet 128 (you designate this when paying dues). Any DS Owner can sail in the MBYC Bay Series races, but will not be included in the scoring for Champion-

ship Races and will not be permitted to enter the Championship Regatta on Labor Day. Sign up for DaySailer Association at https://www.daysailer.org/We'll discuss the idea and make a group decision at our Winter DS Fleet Meeting on Feb 23.

What is the "Narrow Channel Rule"

Perhaps you've noticed the following paragraph in the current MBYC Small Boat Racing Generic Sailing Instructions:

"13. Right-of-Way: USGS <u>nar-row channel rules</u> apply. Racers MUST give way to larger vessels with limited maneuverability in the confines of the bay."

Being curious sailors, you may have wondered what this is all about. Also, if you're the Principle Race Officer (PRO) for the race day, you may have wondered what this might mean for you? Maybe you've never actually noticed this paragraph. In either case, this article is about the "Narrow Channel Rule", and what it means to folks racing dinghies in Morro Bay.

Sometimes, the MBYC Small Boat Portsmouth Handicap Races, or One Design Fleet Races (Lido 14, Flying Junior, Optimist, or Day Sailor) use the Yacht Club dock to start and finish the races. Also, some races may be held in other parts of the Bay, but essentially anytime we're racing "in the channel" (between the red and green channel markers), we must comply with the Narrow Channel Rule, often referred to as Rule 9. This rule has some very specific ramifications for both sailors on the water and the race organizers and the PRO for the day.

The Narrow Channel Rule can be found in the US Code of Federal Regulations (CFR), Title 33, Chapter I, Subchapter E, Part 83 Subpart B titled "Conduct of Vessels in Any Condition of Visibility", § 83.09 Narrow channels (Rule 9). Paragraph b. Which reads, in part:

"(b) A vessel of less than 20 meters in length or a sailing vessel shall not impede the passage of a vessel that can safely navigate only within a narrow channel or fairway."

So what does this mean to folks racing in front of MBYC? Simply, **EVERYBODY ELSE HAS RIGHT OF WAY** (except, maybe, personal watercraft, but we really don't want to hit them either). For a race committee, running a race from the deck is pretty nice with tables and chairs, a kitchen and of course bathrooms close by. But from the PRO or competitors point of view there is a little more to keep in mind.


The PRO should set up two lookouts before commencing a start sequence. The lookouts will be positioned to view each direction of the channel and will have separate roles than others on the committee (like flag hoist, line spotter, time keeper, etc). These lookouts will be spotting channel traffic including commercial or private fishing boats,

party boats like the Chablis (AKA "THE Winebox"), or even rental electric boats. The lookouts provide real-time information to the PRO. It is the PRO who will determine if the race sequence should continue or be postponed to allow for commercial traffic to clear before recommencing the start sequence.

One of the most important flags for a PRO is commonly known as the "Cat in the Hat" flag (or the AP Flag). Yes, it does look like Seuss's Cat's hat! It looks like this:



Anytime during a start sequence that things "go off the rails", for any reason including oncoming traffic, the PRO can call a halt to the sequence. Then the sequence will simply just start over after the issue or the traffic has cleared. Of course competitors may not be happy, but overall the PRO is there to ensure that everyone has a fair chance and a safe environment to race.

Side note to PROs using the Postpone (AP) Flag: There are 2 short horn blows when the AP is raised, and 1 short blast when it is removed. The start sequence will restart when the P flag is raised ONE MINUTE AFTER THE AP FLAG IS DROPPED. One horn is sounded when the P Flag is raised and the sequence continues as outlined in the Sailing Instructions. This can be adjusted when other start sequences are used by the Race Committee.

The PRO of the day has discretion to continue a start sequence or to postpone due to traffic or any other reason. Other common reasons to postpone are weather, unmoored marks, wind shift, missed flag signals, etc. I believe that we should be fairly

conservative in managing races in the channel. I've personally witnessed, or been directly involved with some very sketchy situations that may have been avoided by postponing a race start.

Every skipper knows that it is their overall responsibility for safety on the water. While the PRO might spot a potential issue and avoid the situation ahead of time, the boat's skipper must always be aware of the situation on the water. At all times, but more so in a very narrow channel, this INCLUDES non racing traffic that will have right of way. This can be a difficult task. Often a skipper is focused

on timing her line cross exactly as the race starts, while avoiding other competitors, or actively working their own right of way rules to her advantage. Keeping an eye up and down channel for traffic can be difficult, or even impossible. In a tight grouping of boats at the start line it's easy for line of sight to be blocked by competitors and sails. It's also

difficult to focus on the start, competitors and to be aware of traffic up or down the channel. Of course in our beloved bay, we're frequently sailing into a mooring field and sometimes dealing with pretty fast current. In short there is a LOT going on! In addition to the boat's skipper her crew will always be keeping an eye on elements of the start. Some skipper's will ask crew to keep an eye on specific elements, one could be channel traffic. Also competitor's can warn others of oncoming traffic to make sure that everyone on the water is aware of a changing situation.

I encourage our race day PRO's to be very active in managing the start sequence so that competitors do NOT face a developing issue with traffic. This could mean postponing a start once or even more times. But I feel it is much better to postpone a start and avoid traffic in the channel than to stay in sequence and possibly set up a situation for an accident on the water. Always, competitors must have a very high level of situational awareness whenever racing, even more so during start sequences in front of the MBYC.

A fogone conclusion

Chances are when you are on the water you will occasionally encounter fog, making navigation a challenge. Because of the time it can take to stop or turn a marine vessel, fog is usually considered dense for mariners if it reduces visibility to less than 1 mile. Fog can form quickly and catch boaters off guard. Visibility can be reduced to a few feet, which can disorient even the most experienced boaters. The international standards for describing reduced visibility in marine forecasts are as follows:

Very Poor: Less than 0.5 nautical miles

Poor: 0.5 to less than 2 nautical miles

Moderate: 2 to 5 nautical miles Good: Greater than 5 nautical miles Learning to navigate through fog (or avoiding it) is critical to safe boating. These safety tips will help to keep you safe:

- -Slow down to avoid collisions.
- -Turn on all of your running lights, even in daytime.
- -Listen for sounds of other boats that may be near you or for fog horns and bells from nearby buoys.
- -VHF NOAA Weather Radio should broadcast important information concerning the formation, movement or dissipation of the fog. Pay close attention.
- -If your vessel has radar, use it to help locate dangers that may be around you.
- -Use GPS or a navigation chart to help obtain a fix on your location.
- -If you are unable to get your bearings, stay put until the fog lifts but make sure you are in a safe location.
- -Be familiar with horn and bell sounds you should produce to warn others around you when in dense fog.
- -Have a compass available. Even if you don't know where you are in the fog, with a compass you can determine the direction you are navigating.
- -Stay out of shipping lanes. Large ships cannot see you!
